The performance of many of the students was highly entertaining, especially the 'Mimicry of Stammering' by Sj. K. D. Banerjee of the First Year Class so took the house by storm that Professor D. N. Mukherjee simply voiced the feeling of the entire audience when he offered a prize to the clever young man. Light refreshments in the best style followed the recitations and dramatic exhibitions. 'It may be added that the students raised subscriptions among themselves for meeting the incidental expenses but the Principal was so well pleased with the whole affair that he made an announcement that he would defray all the expenses—an announcement that was received by the assembly with loud and prolonged cheers.

The College-School celebrated its annual gathering and Sports on Saturday the 3rd May in the morning hours. The Principal of the College presided and there was a varied and interesting programme (too long for insertion in the pages of the Magazine) of songs, Recitations, renderings of select scenes in English and Bengalee followed by drill and gymnastics. The proceedings wound up with the singing in chorus of 'God Save the King,' the whole assembly standing. Light refreshments in the best style were served before the guests and the gathering parted with three cheers for the President and other honoured guests.

## THE RESULTS.

The results of the I. Sc. Examination were published in the Calcutta Gazette of the 18th June. 727 have passed in the First Division, 415 in the Second Division and 37 in the Third Division, bringing up the total to 1179. The total is higher than last year's by more than 200—a proof of the growing zeal for Science evinced by the young men of Bengal.

At the I. Sc. Examination, our College has passed 172, the largest number passed by any Calcutta College, just as it was the case in the three previous years; nay, this year it is a record number that has passed, being considerably higher than the number of previous years. Of these, 84 have been placed in the First Division, 78 in the Second Division, and 10 in the Third Division. Besides, a good many have passed as non-Collegiate Students, several of whom are to be put to the credit of this College.

The results of the I. A. Examination were published in the Gazette of India on Saturday the 12th July. 1520 have been placed in the First Division, 2010 in the Second Division and 601 in the Third Division, bringing up the total to 4131. The total is higher than last year's by a little over one thousand!

At the I. A. Examination, our College has passed 198, of whom 30 have been placed in the First Division, 107 in the Second Division and 61 in the Third Division. It is matter for congratulation that the number is larger than in the previous year. Besides, several have passed as non-Collegiate Students.

The results of the B. A. Honours Examination were published in the Gazette of India of the 7th June and those of the B. A. Pass Examination as well as the B. Sc. Examination (both Pass and Honours) were published in the Calcutta Gazette of the 2nd July. At the B. A. Examination, 292 have obtained Honours, 141 have passed with Distinction, and 1307 have passed in the Pass Course, bringing up the total to 1740. At the B. Sc. Examination, 71 have obtained Honours, 90 have passed with Distinction and 165 have passed in the Pass Course, bringing up the total to 326. It is a satisfactory to note that the number of successes at both the Examinations is a little higher than in the previous year.

Cur College has passed 49 at the B. A. Examination, of whom 3 have obtained Honours (in English), 5 have passed with Distinction, and 41 in the Pass Course. At the B. Sc. Examination, our College has passed 16, of whom 2 have obtained Distinction. Besides, several have passed as non-Collegiate Students at both the Examinations.

The names of the successful candidates from this College at all these Examinations are, in accordance with our usual practice, published in the closing pages of the College Calendar.

The results of the Matriculation Examination were published in the Calcutta Gazette of the 11th June. As the results were arranged according to the schools from which the candidates appeared and their Roll-numbers, the total number of successful candidates cannot be ascertained from the published list without laborious counting of the well-nigh interminable array of names.

The College-School has passed 46, of whom 26 have been placed in the First, 17 in the Second and 3 in the Third Division.

Last year we adverted to two novel features of the method of publication of the results, namely (1) the results of some of the Examinations were published by the University at its own cost and sold for a small price, and (2) the results of some of the Examinations, as soon as they were ready, were sent to the Schools and Colleges concerned. Both these useful features have been discarded this year and two other features have been introduced this year, which are of doubtful utility. (1) The results of the B. A. Honours Examination were published some weeks in advance of the results of the Pass Examination, and as the names of the Honours candidates who failed to secure Honours but passed in the Pass Course, were not published at this stage, it only entailed a further period of anxious and more acute suspense on this class of candidates. (2) At the Intermediate Examinations, certain distinguishing marks have been placed against the names of candidates who have got 7.0% of the

aggregate number of marks and 80°/0 of the marks in any subject subjects. This means some additional labour to the Tabulators or to the clerical staff of the University but we fail to see what good it does. If superior merit is to be indicated, it is desirable in the higher i. e. the Degree Examinations and not in the lower Examinations of the University. And yet this innovation has not been introduced into the results of the B. A. and B. Sc. Candidates who have obtained Honours or Distinction!
