Eloquent tributes were paid to the memory of the deceased, and a condolence resolution was passed in solemn silence. May his soul rest in peace.

We regret to announce the death of Sreeman Santinath Mukerjee of the 3rd year Arts Class, and of Gobindo Gopal Roy, a student in Sec. C. of the first year I.Sc. Class, and our deep sympathy goes for the bereaved families.

We know not how to sympathise with Prof. Protul Chandra Ghosh in his recent bereavement. His only son was born on the 19th July and breathed his last on the 7th December, 1929. Riddle of Destiny! A French Class has been opened in our College (thatiks to the efforts of Prof. A. Das-Gupta), and as many as twenty-six students have already joined the class. It is understood that some members of the teaching staff have expressed their willingness to take lessons in French.

We hope the authorities will kindly see their way to complying with this very just request of our students.

Our hearty welcome to Prof. J. C. Banerjee, late of Patna College, who has recently joined our staff on retiring from Government service. Prof. J. C. Banerjee's profound scholarship is too well known to be mentioned here. We hope he will add to that lustre of our Institution which, alas! seems to be so bedimmed by the death of Prof Lalit Kumar Barerjee.
