THE MONTH.

The removal of several of the School-classes to a hired building in the immediate neighbourhood has placed the entire third and fourth storeys of the School-building at the disposal of the College. This has brought about a marked improvement of the accommodation for the College Department. The old library-room has now been made a part of the Botanical Laboratory and the Library has been removed to the large hall where the Fourth Year B. A. Class used to sit. The spacious hall with its excellent arrangement of light and air now serves not only as the Library but also as a commodious reading-room for students at off-time. The Fourth Year B. A. Class has been removed to an equally large hall in the third storey of the School-building and another large hall in the same storey serves as a lecture-hall for the Intermediate Students. The three rooms that form the fourth storey serve as tutorial classes. We further hope that the day is not far-off when the whole School Department will be removed to a building of its own, thus leaving the lower storeys of the School-building at the disposal of the College.

The College has recently purchased at the cost of Rs. 5500/- a large assortment of scientific apparatus which was advertised for sale by the authorities of Bishop's College, Calcutta.

Sriman Sukumar Bhattacharyya, who has obtained Honours in English this year from our College, has been granted a College Scholarship of Rs. 8/- a month in order to enable him to carry on his further studies. He has joined the University post-graduate classes in English but under Sec. 34, Para 1, Chap. XI of the University Regulations his name will continue to be borne on the rolls of our College.

The cases of *three* candidates were still under consideration when the B. A. results were published in the middle of July. We are glad to find that these three candidates have since been declared as passed. This brings up the total of B. A.'s (including those who have passed with Distinction and those who have obtained Honours) to 1708.

As Sir Sidney Lee's *Great Englishmen of the 16th Century* prescribed for B. A. Honours in English for 1919 is not available in the market, *Carlyle's Heroes* (Lectures I.—IV.) has been prescribed as an alternative text-book. The last four essays contained in the latest edition of the *University Selections from Addison* have been excluded from the I. A. & I. Sc. Course in English for 1919.

We may remind the students of the current session that the Students' Fund started some years ago by the students of this College is at a rather low ebb and it is high time that the present students should exert themselves in the matter. It is desirable that there should be a regulated system of payment of subscriptions as in the School Department and that 3 or 4 students of each class or section of a class should act as Representatives. All subscriptions and donations are to be collected by them and made over to Professor Bhavabibhuti Bhattacharyya M. A., Honorary Treasurer of the Students' Fund.
