our students will raise a suitable memorial to their departed friends.

THE RESULTS

The results of the I. Sc. Examination were published in the Calcutta Gazette on the 12th May. 399 have passed in the First Division, (as against 612 of last year) 788 in the Second Division (as against 856 of last year) and 301 in the Third Division (as against 277 of last year.) The total thus comes up to 1312, which is lower than the last year's figure by 433. There is thus a distinct fall in the number passed at the I. Sc. Examination.

At the I. Sc Examination our College has passed 261. This is the largest number passed by any College, just as it has been the case in the last sixteen years. Of this total 54 have passed in the First Division, 138 in the Second Division, and the rest in the Third Division. We congratulate Sreemans Durgagati Bhattacharyya and Gorapada Das on their having secured the 8th and 10th places respectively in order of merit. Sreeman Gorapada has obtained a first-grade Senior Scholarship of Rs. 25 a month from the Assam Government while Sreeman Durgagati Bhattacharyya has obtained a second-grade Senior Scholarship of Rs. 20 a month.

The results of the I. A. Examination were published in the Calcutta Gazette along with the results of the I. Sc. Examination. 512 have passed in the First Division (as against 482 of the previous year), 971 in the Second Division (as against 942 of last year), and 319 in the Third Division (as against 287 of last year.) The total thus comes up to 1802, which is higher than the last year's figure by 91.

At the I. A. Examination our College has passed 32 (as against 24 of last year). Of these 7 have been placed in the First Division, 19 in the Second Division, and the rest in the Third Division When we consider that only a little over 60 students were sent up for the I. A. Examination, we cannot find fault with our passes. Our Arts Department is showing signs of improvement, and we expect far better results in the coming years.

The results of the B. Sc. Examination were published in the Calcutta Gazette on the 7th July. 63 have obtained Honours (as against 85 of last year), 151 have passed with distinction (as against 121 of last year), and 226 have passed in the pass course (as against 329 of last year). The total is thus brought up to 440, which is lower than the last year's figure by 95.

At the B. Sc. Examination our College has passed 24. Of these 9 have passed with Distinction, the rest being placed in the Pass course.

The results of the B. A. Examination were published in the Calcutta Gazette of the 7th July. 286 have obtained Honours (as against 329 of the previous year), 142 have passed with Distinction (as against 178 of last year), and 1206 in the Pass course (as against 1453 of last year). This brings the total up to 1634, which is lower than the last year's output by 326.

At the B. A. Examination our College has passed 31. Of these 3 have obtained Honours, 3 have passed with Distinction, the remaining 25 being placed in the Pass course. We congratulate Sreeman Harashit Kumar Mukhopadhyaya on his obtaining first class Honour in Sanskrit.

The results of the Matriculation Examination were published in the 'Calcutta Gazette of the 9th June. As the present practice of the University is to publish the results school by school, it is difficult to say how many have passed in the First Division, how many in the Second, and how many in the Third, or what the total number passed is. The percentage of success, we understand, is about 66.7.

The College School sent up fifty seven candidates for the last Matriculation examination. Of these, forty-one came out successful; twenty being placed in the first division, twenty in the second division and one in the third division. The percentage of success was 71.93, (much higher than the University percentage). One secured a junior scholarship of fifteen rupees a month, against two of Rs 10/- each last year.

The school lost by death on the 4 of June last one of its veteran teachers, Babu Narendra Nath Majumdar, who had been on the teaching staff since 1909 and had served the school with considerable credit. Many of his students are now fathers of families and still cherish his memory with loving respect. An oil painting of his has been prepared by his colleagues and pupils, and will be unveiled and placed in the school just before the Puja Vacation.

The school has also lost, in the late Prof. K. D. Mullick. one of its best workers on the school Managing Committee. Indeed. Prof. Mullick has left behind him an undying fame as a sincere and indefatiguable worker in the interest of the school.
